DIRECTOR'S NOTES

How can a play about so much claim to be about nothing? So much happens in *Much Ado About Nothing* that it could be argued that it is a play about everything. There's a masquerade party, an engagement, an aborted wedding, a funeral, a trial, and yet another wedding, all in the immediate aftermath of war. So what gives, Will?

It may help to know that Shakespeare loved nothing so much as a good pun, and if said pun was also a fairly racy double entendre, all the better. The title *Much Ado About Nothing*, is both. First off, "nothing" is a pun for the word "noting," here meant "to spy, or eavesdrop." Every major complication is either caused or resolved by characters hearing and seeing things that they were either not meant to or meant to misconstrue. The double entendre here is "nothing" as in, "no thing." As in "she has nothing between her legs." So the play, rightly, could be titled Much Ado About...well, you get the idea. A play about nothing indeed.

This may be the most grounded of Shakespeare's comedies; no fairies, no supernatural occurrences, no deus ex-machina to bring about the solution. It is a play that could just as easily end in tragedy. (The similarities between this and *Othello* must be noted. See what I did there?) Clearly, this is a play about something. It is about people navigating love and life in a changing world. And love and life are never darker than when they are held to be nothing.

Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival

Started in 1969 by Roger L. Stevens, the Kennedy Center's founding chairman, the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival (KCACTF) is a national theater program involving 18,000 students from colleges and universities nationwide which has served as a catalyst in improving the quality of college theater in the United States. The KCACTF has grown into a network of more than 600 academic institutions throughout the country, where theater departments and student artists showcase their work and receive outside assessment by KCACTF respondents.

The goals of the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival are: to encourage, recognize, and celebrate the finest and most diverse work produced in university and college theater programs; to provide opportunities for participants to develop their theater skills and insight; and achieve professionalism; to improve the quality of college and university theater in America; to encourage colleges and universities to give distinguished productions of new plays, especially those written by students; the classics, revitalized or newly conceived; and experimental works.

Through state, regional, and national festivals, KCACTF participants celebrate the creative process, see one another's work, and share experiences and insights within the community of theater artists. The KCACTF honors excellence of overall production and offers student artists individual recognition through awards and scholarships in playwriting, acting, criticism, directing, and design.

The KCACTF is a year-round program in eight geographic regions in the United States. Regional activities are coordinated through eight KCACTF regional chairs and eight KCACTF playwriting awards chairs. With funding and administrative support from the Kennedy Center, the regional chair coordinates with the Co-Managers of KCACTF all aspects of the adjudication of productions on the local and regional level and supervises regional-level KCACTF award competitions. The playwriting chair works with schools that have entered new and student-written plays by providing expertise in the development of new scripts--assessment specifically designed for a developing play--and by providing information on the numerous playwriting awards offered.

In January and February of each year, regional festivals showcase the finest of each region's entered productions and offer a variety of activities, including workshops, symposia, and regional-level award programs. Regional festival productions are judged by a panel of three judges selected by the Kennedy Center and the KCACTF national committee. These judges in consultation with the Artistic Director select four to six of the best and most diverse regional festival productions to be showcased in the spring at the annual noncompetitive national festival at the Kennedy Center, all expenses paid.

Since its inception, KCACTF has given more than 400,000 college theater students the opportunity to have their work critiqued, improve their dramatic skills and receive national recognition for excellence.

More than 16 million theatergoers have attended approximately 10,000 festival productions nationwide.



Happy Songs About Unhappy Things

Film Screening and Q & A with Creator, Nikki Lynette

One in 4 people in the world will be affected by mental health issues in their lifetime. In *Happy Songs About Unhappy Things*, indie artist Nikki Lynette is urging us to confront the stigma in ways we never have before.

In 2018, a black female suicide survivor learning to live with a mental illness decided to shine a light on the parts of the mental health journey that nobody talks about. The resulting docu-musical uses a unique combination of high concept, visually arresting storytelling, and an earworm-laden score, to highlight folks sharing their lived experience and two amazing mental health professionals who tell it like it is.

Happy Songs About Unhappy Things is a groundbreaking new project that aims to disrupt the harmful narratives around mental health. By blending documentary footage, statistics, digital art, and mental health expert testimonials with sensational theatrical performances, Nikki Lynette invites us into a musical playground that allows audiences to explore the deepest parts of themselves while feeling empowered along the way.
