Judith Kuipers

Judith Kuipers, who left an indelible mark at UW-La Crosse as the first woman to serve as chancellor, died Oct. 15 at age 87.

Kuipers became the eighth leader in school history in 1991 and went on to lead UWL until 2000 — a transformative decade that saw the university reach new levels of excellence and become a rising star in the Universities of Wisconsin system.

"We know that Judy's legacy will continue to endure here at UWL and we have nothing but the deepest gratitude for all she accomplished and the way she led this fine institution," Chancellor James Beeby says. "She was a role model and

mentor to so many and clearly a transformative chancellor."

Major accomplishments during Kuipers' tenure include establishing the La Crosse Health Science Consortium, constructing and renovating several campus facilities, adding eight new majors and other academic offerings, and kickstarting the university's undergraduate research program.

In 2000, friends and colleagues established the Judith L. Kuipers Scholarship at UWL in her honor.
