

Tips for using limited speech notes.

There are many benefits to delivering speeches with limited notes.

- It can increase immediacy with audiences.
- It encourages eye contact with the audience.
- It helps support effective nonverbal delivery.

Here are some strategies you can use to effectively craft these types of notes.

Ways to prepare to successfully deliver the speech:

- Space out preparation time
- Choose a topic that is interesting and engaging to you
- Use notes for the terms that you are concerned that you will forget.
- Practice speech multiple times to help reduce speaking anxiety.
 - o Practice the introduction more frequently than the full speech to help build confidence.

Prior to creating notecards or notes:

- Clarify what the assignment expectations are some instructors will include specific limits on the number of notecards allowed or words allowed on notecards.
- Utilize partial memorization techniques (practice delivering the speech at each step):
 - Start with a full sentence speech/preparation outline.
 - Then, develop a keyword, partial sentence outline.
 - o Focus on the main points of the speech.
 - From there, develop a keyword outline with important phrases and keywords.
 - Outline could include:
 - o Key authors and dates
 - o Important terms from the speech

Keep in mind...

- Your speech will be slightly different each time it's OK.
- Everyone in the class is having the same experience they want you to be successful too!
- Delivering a speech with limited notes is common in UWL classes and the professional environment.
